**Summary:** Philip Roundy is believed to have been born on the Isle of Guernsey, Channel Islands. He came to America in the early 1600s. He settled in Salem, Massachusetts. He had two wives and three known children - Mark, Robert and Mary. He died in 1678. Descendants and relatives lived mainly in Massachusetts, Vermont, New York, Iowa, Utah and Idaho.

When Philip Roundy came to America from England, he settled in the rustic village of Salem in the Massachusetts Bay Colony, in the throes of a powerful religious turmoil. The first settlers had practised a rigid moral code and when Roger Williams and Ann Hutchinson ventured to suggest more liberal ideas, remonstrances and eviction from the town was the lot of the innovators. Even the chaste Quakers were not permitted to remain in this place for fear of spreading evil influence. Witchcraft was beginning to make its appearance. As Philip looked for a means of earning a livelihood, it is thought that he found employment as a custodian of one of the warehouses on the waterfront. He is believed to have married twice, the name of the first wife unknown. Philip's marriage in Salem to Ann Bush was November 1671. Philip Roundy died in the spring of 1678. Salem records contain the inventory of his estate and allowed in court: at Salem the 27th day of April, 1676, and "administration granted to Ann, the relic of ye deceased. It is thought that Philip was born on the Isle of Guernsey in the English Channel before sailing to America from England. (Information from ROUNDY FAMILY IN AMERICA, p. 3-7, 331)

The first wife of Philip Roundy is not known, but in November, 1671, he married Anna Bush at Salem for a second wife; he had by his first wife: Robert, died at Beverly, Mass., November 16, 1715, married Deborah Plumb, July 13, 1678; Mark, he was a soldier in King Philip's War, and was wounded in the Narragansett Battle in December 1675; and by his second wife he had Mary, married Thomas Walter, April 19, 1695.

Robert Roundy (son of Philip) was a Coaster, and was sometimes called Doctor, he had a warehouse in Beverly. By his wife, Deborah Plumb, he had: Elizabeth, John, Mary, Deborah, Esther and Benjamin.

John Roundy (son of Robert), resided first in Beverly, and second in Marblehead, Mass.; he married (1) December 2, 1703, in Beverly, Mary Daland, (and by her had: Robert and Lydia), and (2) Elizabeth Savery at Marblehead, and by her had: John, Elizabeth, Martha, Sarah, Joseph, Abraham and Thomas.

#### ESTATE OF PHILIP ROUNDY OF SALEM.

Administration upon the estate of Phillip Roundy, intestate, was granted 25:4m:1678, unto Ann, the relict. She brought in an inventory and the estate was ordered to remain in her hands for her necessary use.

Inventory of the estate of Phillip Roundy, deceased, appraised, June 24, 1678, by Richard Croade and William Hollis: a small feather Bed & small Bolster with Two little pillows, a paire of pillow Beers & a paire of Linnen sheetes & a paire of Blankets & a Rugg, all being well worne, also y<sup>e</sup> bedsteed & old curtains & old canopy, 4li.; an old brase Kettle, 6s.; an old fire shovell & a paire of Tonges & a spitt, all little more in vallue then old Iron, 3s. 6d.; an old small Iron pott & pott hookes, 3s. 6d.; A Trammell & an old Fryeing pann, 4s.; 3 pewter platters, 8s.; 3 pewter porringers, an old pewter drinking cup & pewter Bole, 3s. 6d.; 6 old chaires whereof 2 or 3 Broken, 3s. 6d.; 1 Table with an oake leaf about six foote Long, 10s.; 1 Little old Table & a chest, 5s.; 3 Latten Frying pannes, 2s.; one very small Trundle beadd being but few belonging in it, with ye Bedsteed and that Little Furniture belonging to it, 1li. 10s.; a Letten candlesticke, 6d.; total, 7li. 19s. 6d. Possibly some debts that may be owing to this estate but what ye widdow cannot tell, neither doth shee know how much ye abovesaid estate of her deceased husband's may be indebted, "Therefore ye poore widdow humbly requests this honored Court to direct her in a way what to doe in this her desolate case that shee may be cleare & also that shee may haue some consideration out of ye estate towards ye maintenance of her poore orphan since her Fathers decease to this tyme." Allowed 27:4:1678 upon oath of Ann, the widow.

In y<sup>e</sup> name of God Amen I Robert Roundy of Beverly in y<sup>e</sup> County of Essex & Province of y<sup>e</sup> Massachusetts - Bay in New England Chastly being weak & sick of body but yet thro' Divine Goodness of sound mind & memory Do make this my Last Will & Testament in manner & form following: And firstly recommending my Soule unto y<sup>e</sup> mercy of God thro' Jesus Christ in whom alone I hope for Salvation Unto Eternal life And my body to y<sup>e</sup> Earth to be Decently buried at y<sup>e</sup> Discretion of my Executors hereafter named - And as to y<sup>e</sup> temporall Estate God hath been pleased to lend me my Will is. Inprimis that my just Debts & funerals Charges be paid & discharged

Item I Give & bequeath to my Loving wife Deborah the one half of my personal Estate to be at her own Disposal for ever. And the Use of so much as shee shall receive for cause of my Real Estate so long as shee shall Remain my Widow viz of all my housing & lands viz Housing & Lands to what & wheresoever to be to him & his Heires for ever Indistinctly after y<sup>e</sup> expiration of my wife Deborahs her interest therein my son paying such charges as are herein after mentioned

Item My will is that in case my son Benjamin live not to y<sup>e</sup> age twenty one years or Die leaving no Lawfull Issue that then all my aforesd Housing & lands is hereby Given to my three Daughters & Grandson Robert son of John Roundy in Equall parts to w<sup>ch</sup> they paying out five pounds to each of my Grandchildren Lidia Trask & Sarah Trask y<sup>e</sup> Daughters of my Daughter Deborah to be to my said three Daughters viz Elizabeth Picket Mary Smith & Hester Roundy & Grandson Robert Roundy aforesd in Equall proportion to them & their Heires for ever

Item My will is I do bequeath to my Loving Daughter, Elizabeth Picket & Mary Smith And to my aforesd Grandson Robert Roundy to each y<sup>e</sup> sum of fifteen pounds, & to my Daughter Esther Roundy the sum of twenty pounds, & to my Grandchildren Lidia & Sarah Trask to each y<sup>e</sup> sum of twenty Millings all y<sup>e</sup> sd Legacies to be paid to y<sup>e</sup> son Benjamin the one half of each of y<sup>e</sup> saids to each person respectively in three years next after Benjamin is Arrived at y<sup>e</sup> Age of twenty & one years, the other half in three years next after my aforesd wife Deborahs her Interest in my Estate for term of life or Widowhood shall be expired

Item My will is that Any of my housing & lands, may with y<sup>e</sup> Consent of my Executor be sold for y<sup>e</sup> paying of Any y<sup>e</sup> aforesd Legacies or other my just Debts whereby my Estate is obliged & involved

Item My will is & I do hereby constitute & appoint my Loving wife Deborah to be the sole Executor of this my Last will & Testamentt untill my son Benjamin shall Arrive at y<sup>e</sup> Age of twenty one years, & then He shall be Joynt Executor with my sd wife - And I do hereby Null all former wills by me made And Declare this to be my Last Will & Testament In witness whereof I set hereunto my hand & Seale the fifteenth Day of November Anno Domini seventeen hundred & fifteen
