JOHN NORTHEY was born 28 February 1604/5 in Holborn, England. However, in 1672 John testified that he was "about 65" and on 3: 14: 1674, he testified he was about 66 (Records and Files of the Quarterly Courts of Essex County, hereafter EQCR, 5:110; 6:363). John Northey died 30 June 1694 in Marblehead in the Massachusetts Bay Colony. He married in 1645, probably in Marblehead, DOROTHY (or DEMARIS) (surname unknown).

The first record found for John Northey was in January of 1641 when Richard Cooke sued him for slander (Records and Files of the Quarterly Courts of Essex County, 1:32). There are several other citations in the first two volumes of the Quarterly Court Records, when John was fined for various offenses, such as drinking wine, swearing, and "drawing his knife" against one Thomas Carter (ibid., 1:77, 275; 2:251). From then on John Northey seems to have been a more conforming inhabitant, serving on juries, etc.

"John Northy was a fisherman and was at Marblehead as early as 1645 when he purchased for 5 pounds, 12 1/2 acres in the 'Plains Farm' which had belonged to Capt. William Hathorne. He owed the estate of George Pollard in 1646, was 'stinted' for pasturage of one cow in 1647. In 1668/9 he signed the customs petition. Later he became a Quaker* (Thomas E. Gray, The Founding of Marblehead [1984], 103.

John Northey was literate as shown by the fact that he signed his name rather then making a mark in September of 1667 (EQCR, 3:437). On 18 December 1677, he, with others from Marblehead, took the Oath of Fidelity before Samuel Ward, Commissioner of Marblehead (ibid., 6:399).

The Will of John Northy, Sr., signed 8 November 1688; proved 30 June 1691; Essex Probate, 19599

In the name of God Amen, I John Northey of Marblehead, being of sound memory and knowing the uncertainty of this life and desirous to settle the estate lent me by God ... declare this my Last Will and Testament: I will that my just debts be paid and satisfied in common by my two children John Northey and Sarah Martin, part & parcel alike, giving them liberty, if they see meet, out of the real estate hereafter given, to award absolutely so much as may respond the sums and also the legacy of 4 pounds which I give to my grandchild John Picket to be paid within 12 months after the entry on this estate if he be of age, part and parcel alike by my aforesaid children John Northey and Sarah Martin; to Dorothy Picket I give the house plot on the other side of the quay, where the planter once lived. The remainder of my estate I bequeath to my two above-named children, John Northey and Sarah Martin. The movable parts, part alike, my housing and land in manner following: to my son John the new part of my dwelling house and also the land backward to be divided from the rest by a straight line to run from the northernmost end of said house over to the W corner of Mistress Knott's wall in her pasture on a W line. And one part of the house on an E line down to the land of William Wahle with 1/2 of the barn with the fences, garden, orchard and all privileges thereto belonging and in particular free ingress and regress ... from that door to the street to hold the land during his natural life. And after his decease, my will is that it descend to and be enjoyed by the lawful heirs of his body in fee simple, so many of them as possible ... forever. The other part of the said housing and land I give the same to my daughter Sarah viz: the land in the front from the aforesaid described lane to the highway and the other part of my dwelling house with the other half of the barn with all rights and privileges. Also my part of land in the farm which was formerly made use of by my son-in-law John Martin -- to be enjoyed by her during her natural life ... after whose usage, my will is that this house, barn, and 1/2 of land adjoining them descend to be enjoyed by her oldest son John Martin and the lawful heirs of his body. And the other part of the land descend to be enjoyed by her other sons, viz: Peter, Samuel, Robert and Thomas and said house forever part and part alike together with the farm to be equally divided among all the 5 sons and enjoyed by them forever. I constitute my son John Northey Executor of this will, and in witness of all this hereunto set to my hand and seal, the 8the day of November 1688 ("if he be of age," interlined before seals). Signed: John Northey and a seal. Witnesses: Erasmus James, Nathaniel Norden, William Watly.

The inventory of the estate included house and land at 100 pounds; his part in the farm, 7 pounds and apparel and bedding, 1 pound. The estate was appraised on 23 December 1689 by John Legg and Nathaniel Norden. Final settlement, 30 June 1691.

In time one of his descendants left it to his widow Mary Vinal Northey, who subscquently married James Woodworth, who seems to have then moved to the Northey homestead. Their son Benjamin lived on the old Northey place, and there was born his son Samuel Woodworth, the celebrated poet of "The Old Oaken Bucket." The Ewell-Northey-Woodworth house was entirely torn down a few years ago, and another was built a few yards from the site of the old one. The well, however, which the poet has celebrated in immortal song, is still there,

The ancestral line of General Pickett has been traced to Nicholas Pickett, who was born about 1649, and an inhabitant of Marblehead, Massachusetts, as early as 1670, then a young man about twenty-one years of age. He married a daughter of John Northey. Of his connection with other families of the same name, or from whence he came to Massachusetts, the records are silent. It is believed that by occupation he was a mariner. He was living in 1692. He had children: Henry, born about 1676; Nicholas, born about 1678, died 1825; John, born about 1680, died May, 1763; Dorothy, born about 1682, married Thomas Stevens.

(II) John Pickett, born about 1680, died May, 1763, was a fisherman, and later a shoreman, residence Marblehead. February 16, 1727, he bought for 250 pounds a tract of land near the southerly end of the town, of Peter Levally. He married, January 17, 1704, Elizabeth Kelley, a daughter of John and Grace Kelley. Elizabeth died 1720. July 22, 1737, he bought the mansion house once the homestead of his deceased father-in-law. John Kel-John Pickett married (second), October 31, 1721, Elizabeth Savory. By his will dated April 1, 1763, we learn that he was owner of the schooner called the Pelican, and one-half of the sloop called the Lizard in which his son John carried on the coasting business. The will also mentions a silver tankard. Children were: John, baptized February 27, 1708-9; Grace, baptized July 17, 1709, died young: William, baptized July 27, 1712, died December, 1761; Joseph, baptized October 10, 1714, died April 11. 1775; Elizabeth, baptized July 27, 1717. died young; Thomas, baptized July 17, 1719-20, died about 1753; Sylvester, baptized March 25, 1722, died young; Elizabeth, baptized May 17, 1724, married Thomas Swan, Jr., living 1763: Nicholas, baptized November 6, 1726, died before 1762.

(III) Thomas Pickett was a mariner, and was lost at sea about 1753. He married Sarah, daughter of Richard Trevett, Jr., and wife whose maiden name was Elizabeth Ingalls. She died 1803. Her great-grandfather, Henry Trevett. is reported as the earliest resident of Marblehead bearing that family name. Their children: Sarah, baptized August 23. 1743, died young: Sarah, bantized July 2, 1749, died unmarried; Thomas, born June 27. 1750, died July 10, 1819; Elizabeth, baptized July 1, 1753, died prior to 1763.

(IV) Thomas Pickett, born June 27, 1750. He removed to Beverly about 1775, where he died July 10, 1819. He was by occupation a sailmaker and married Miriam, daughter of Samuel and Mary Striker, April 18, 1775. She died in Beverly, August 23, 1839. March 8, 1788, he purchased a house and lot of William Abbott, and other real estate transactions were recorded in his name later. Their children were all born in Beverly, but baptized in the old Second Church in Marblehead, the parents taking them over the river in a small boat, there

being no bridge over which to cross the harbor at that time. Their children were: Thomas, born December 10, 1775, died July 4, 1817; Miriam, born May 22, 1777, died October 17, 1818; married Moses Howard. Martha Trevett, born January 25, 1779, died February 14, 1811; married Nehemiah Roundy; Richard, born November 8, 1780, died December 20, 1864; John, born July 29, 1782, died June 13, 1800; Sarah, born June 22, 1784, died February 24, 1809; Samuel Striker, born March 8, 1786, died November 24, 1854; Margaret, born May 31, 1788, was the second wife of Nehemiah Roundy; Charles, born April 15, 1790, died August 8, 1812; Hannah, born July 9, 1792, died December 5, 1818, married Amos Stickney; Josiah, born February 19, 1795, died February 11, 1860; Polly, born March 6, 1797.

(V) Josiah Pickett, born in Beverly, February 19. 1795, died February 11, 1860; married, February 10, 1822. Mary, daughter of John and Mary (Batchelder) Creesy. She was born September 12, 1799, and died in 1879. He served in the United States navy, war of 1812, was taken prisoner and confined in Dartmoor prison, England. After returning home was for some years a seafaring man, but finally adopted his former occupation—that of sailmaking. Children: Josiah, born November 21. 1822; John William, born December 30, 1824, shoemaker; married Susan H. Tucker; Charles, born December 12, 1826, was a mason in Salem, and resided in Beverly; Mary Howard, born February 3, 1820, died September 25, 1833; Sarah Frances, born December 25. 1830, married Dewing Southwick; Mary Elizabeth, born November 13, 1832, married Samuel Bell; Martha, born November 26, 1834. married James H. Kendall; George Augustus, born September 10, 1836, married Agnes G. Munsey; Hepzibah Ann, born June 28, 1843. married (first) Charles L. Woodbury: (second) Charles Friend.

(VI) Josiah Pickett, born in Beverly, November 21, 1822, at the age of thirteen years left his home to carve out his own success in life. He married, December 2, 1847, Elizabeth, daughter of Jacob and Anna Burnham, born March 4, 1827. Since March, 1855, the family home has been in Worcester, Massachusetts. (See sketch). Their children: Frank Lewis, born January 25, 1849, died November 9, 1852; William A., born October 12, 1857.

The foregoing closes the ancestral record of this branch of the Pickett family to date of July, 1905.

Daughter Sarah Northey

The lots marked John Northey and Sarah Martin, with the dwelling house thereon, were the property of John Northey of Marblehead, fisherman, in 1667. He subsequently built an addition to the house, and died possessed of the estate in the spring of 1691. The house and the land were then appraised at one hundred pounds. He devised to his son John Northy the new part of the house, and that part of the lot, the house apparently facing to the southeast. The old part of the house and that part of the lot he devised to his daughter Sarah Martin.

Mrs. Martin was the wife of John Martin, and after his decease she conveyed her part of the estate to her sons, Peter, Samuel, Robert and Thomas, she having only a life interest in the property, under her father's will, Nov. 20, 1714.

John Northey, the son, died possessed of his part of the land before March 31, 1732, when administration was granted upon his estate. the house was gone, apparently, before that date.

It is said of the earliest settlers
MARTIN at Portsmouth and Dover, New
Hampshire, that they "came
here not to worship God. but to tish." This
seems true at other points along the Atlantic
coast, where early records are extremely
meagre. Very little can be learned about the
pioneer ancestor of this family, and it is presumable that he was engaged in fishing, and
did not take a permanent residence at Marblehead.

(I) Robert Martin, born about 1633, made a deposition at Marblehead, Massachusetts, September, 1666, when he was about thirty-three years of age. No further record concerning him is discoverable.

He was the son of John

(II) Thomas Martin, born about 1675, was probably a son of Robert Martin, above mentioned. He married, April 28, 1701, in Marblehead, Eleanor Knott, who was baptized in the First Church of Marblehead, June 19, 1687, being then about four years old, and died July 4, 1859, in Marblehead, aged seventy-six 'years. The records of the First Church at Marblehead show the baptisms of the following children of Thomas and Eleanor: Knott and Sarah (twins), July 8, 1716; Ruth, July 6, 1718, and Thomas, mentioned below. Baptized together, but not twins.

(III) Thomas (2), son of Thomas (i) and Eleanor (Knott) Martin, was baptized October 8, 1721, in the First Church of .Marblehead, and married (first) November 20, 1746, Mary Gourdon (Gordon), daughter of Henry and Tabitha Gordon, baptized January 28, 1728, at St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal) Church, and buried September 26, 1747. Thomas Martin married (second) February 27, 1750, Sarah Goodwin, baptized July 10, 1726, at the First Church of Marblehead, daughter of William and John (Curtis) Goodwin. Children of second marriage, baptized in First Church: Hannah, h'ebruary 3, 1751; Samuel, October 29, 1752; .Mary, August 18, 1754; Eleanor, July 13, 1759; Kachel, October 15, 1761; Elizabeth (died voung); Elizabeth, August 8, 1767.

(IV) Richard, only child of Thomas (2) and Mary (Gordon) Martin, was baptized at the First Church of Marblehead, July 12, 1747, and died March 19, 1836. He married, at First Church, Alarch 14, 1771, Hannah, daughter of William and Mary (Bray) Cruft", baptized January 27, 1751, then about five years old, and died December 4, 1824, aged seventy-eight years. Children baptized in First Church: Sarah. October 31, 1773; Mary (died young); Thomas, mentioned below; Molly, July 13, 1783; Stephen Vickery, September 5. 1784; Knott, January ij, 1788; Nancy, JMarch 28. 1790, and Jane, September 21, 1797. In his old age Richard Martin removed to St. George, Knox county, Maine, with his eldest son.

(V) Thomas (3), eldest son of Richard and Hannah (Crui?) Martin, was baptized at the First Church at Marblehead, November 5, 1780, and settled in St. George, Maine, where the remainder of his life wasspent. He married, about 1804, Margaret McKellar; children, all born in St. George, Maine: i. Richard (q. v.). 2. Eliza, born 1807, married George O'Brien. 3. Catherine W., 1809, married James Sweetland. 4. John, 1810, married, November 3, 1840, Jane Young. 5. Sarah, married Richard Waite Leavitt. 6. Nancy, married Charles McLoon. .Margaret (McKellar) Martin died, and her husband married. May 25, 181 5, Bethea Thorndike, widow of William Keating. She was born May 23, 1781. Children: 7. Margaret, born about 1816; married Captain Henry Spalding, lived in South Thomaston, and died there June II, 1864. 8. Thomas, died in infancy. 9.
