On 26 November 1667, "Henry Coomes [was presented] for abusing Mr. Walton, saying that he preached nothing but lies, [and] was fined or to be whipped" [EQC 3:461]. On the same day, the "court considering the petition from several inhabitants of Marblehead, in reference to the calling and settling of a meet person to join with Mr. Walton for carrying on the work of the ministry among them, approved of the course and Mr. Walton also approving, court appointed Major Hathorne and Mr. Higgesson to assist the people with their advice and counsel" [EQC 3:462].

"We whose names are underwritten being present with Josiah Walthom when he was brought in first from the sea after his wound lightning, on June 23, 1673, affirm & declare that upon the company's motion to the said Josiah Waltom that he would settle his estate he the said Josiah Waltom being of perfect memory and apprehensive of his dissolution did declare that his will was that his brother Nathaniell Waltom and his sister Martha Munjoy should have his grey horse for their own betwixt them, and his

other estate he gave it to his mother Waltom, for her use & benefit during

her natural life, and after her decease to be disposed of by her and

divided among his brothers Nathaniell & Samuell Walthom and his three

sisters, Martha Munjoy, Elizabeth Conant and Mary Bartlet to enjoy an

On 30 September 1700, "Martha Mungie of Marblehead, widow & relict of Benjamin Mungie & the second daughter of Mr. William Walton & his wife Elizabeth late of Marblehead now deceased," deeded to "my loving nephew William Bartlett of the same place ... all my real & personal estate moveable or immoveable which of right did or doth now belong to me either by my own right or purchase, or by the right & purchase of my husband deceased and more particularly all my right and interest to the estate both real & personal of my late honored parents which did or doth come to me by them by will, legacies or any other way by me purchased as also all my right, title & interest which did or doth come to me by my late loving brother Josias Walton late of Marblehead in his part of estate which did come to him by our aforesaid honored parents ..., only reserving to myself so long as it shall please God I shall

live the use & benefit of all this my estate for my comfortable maintenance and also after my decease that my aforesaid cousin and nephew shall well and truly give to my loving sister Elizabeth a good milch cow if I have any and she desire it or the true value thereof, as also three good sheep to my loving brother Samuel Walton ..., also I give to my loving brother Nathan[ie]l Walton after my decease if he be alive three good sheep" [ELR 22:25-26]. In his will, dated 19 May 1708 and proved 26 January 1710/11, "Nathan[ie] Walton of Marbleh[ea]d" bequeathed to "my cousin Will[ia]m Bartlett the eldest son of my sister Mary"; to "Nathan[ie]l Bartlett the eldest son of my cousin William Bartlett"; to "my cousins John & Mary Hoamans"; to "my brother Samual Walton"; to "my

ASSOCIATIONS: Elizabeth (Cooke) Walton, wife of this immigrant, was niece of Rev. John White of Dorchester, Dorset, the organizer of early migration from the West Country to New England [Frances Rose-Troup, John White, The Patriarch of Dorchester [Dorset] and The Founder of Massachusetts, 1575-1648 ... (New York and London, 1930), 406; NEHGR 126:299, 142:361-68]. She was also first cousin of STEPHEN TERRY {1630, Dorchester} [GMB 3:1804-6; NEHGR 55:222-23].

COMMENTS: In 1959 John G. Hunt proposed that William Walton had been born at Wimborne St. Giles, Dorset, based in part on an incorrect published version of the marriage record of William Walton that gave his bride's name as "Elizabeth Cake" [NEHGR 113:319-20]. More importantly, Hunt included information on Walton's activities as a cleric in England.

In 1646 William Walton submitted to the Quarterly Court sitting at Ipswich a list of the dates of birth of seven of his children; three of these children had been born in England and four in New England [EQC 1:107; NEHGR 29:66]. The date of birth for the eldest of these children, son John, was given as 6 April 1627, which would have been four days prior to the marriage of William Walton and Elizabeth Cooke. Examination of a nineteenth-century transcript of the parish register of Seaton, Devon, resolves this discrepancy and adds some additional information about this family [FHL film #916932]. The baptismal date for son John in that transcript is 16 April 1628, which is in line with the marriage date for the parents and suggests that the correct date of birth was 6 April 1628. The baptismal dates for the next two children, Elizabeth and Martha, are consistent with the birth dates. There was a fourth child, a daughter Jane, also baptized at Seaton, but not included in the list of births prepared in 1646, suggesting that she had died young, and perhaps in England, although she was born just a few months before the family sailed for New England. This would also suggest that the son John did survive to cross the Atlantic with his parents, although there is no record for him in New England, other than the record of his birth in the 1646 list. (In 1959 John G. Hunt did publish the record of the baptism of the daughter Jane, although with a slight variation in the date [NEHGR 113:320]. There are a number of errors and misinterpretations in the list of baptismal dates published by Burton Spear in 1992 [M&JCH 17:163-64].)

Pope and Morison placed this immigrant at Weymouth between his residences at Hingham and Marblehead [Pope 477; Morison 403], but this reflects confusion with HENRY WALTHAM {1635, Weymouth}, who appeared in the records as "Mr. Waltham."

On 13 May 1640, the "petition of the inhabitants of Salem for some of their church to have Jeffryes Creek, & land to erect a village there, for Mr. Willi[am] Walton, John Blacke, Willi[am] Allen, Sam[uel] Orchard, Geo[rge] Norton, &c., company, what land & enlargement may be convenient, & is not granted to any other plantation, is granted them, & it is referred to Mr. John Winthrop Junior & Mr. Symon Bradstreete, to settle the bounds of the said village" [MBCR 1:288-89; EQC 7:201-2].

In an undated petition (submitted to the General Court of 6 May 1646), regarding the use of wood at Marblehead by "many fishermen that are strangers," "William Walton" was the first of sixteen signers of the petition [MA Arch 60:35; MBCR 2:147, 3:63].

On 26 September 1670, "Elizabeth Walton" deposed that "when there was a difference between William Beale of Marblehead and his wife about eight or nine years ago, 'my husband Mr. Will[i]am Walton had then the hearing of it and labored betwixt them both and was fully satisfied and spoke to Mr. Higginson in their behalf sometime before his death' " [EQC 4:280].

Roger Conant, youngest of the eight children of the above couplé, was baptized 9 April, 1592 in All Saints' Church, East Budleigh. Probably, he was well educated for his time, and his native ability was proven in many ways after he came to America. After 1609 he went to London, where he served an apprenticeship of seven years to the Salters' Company. Afterward he engaged in business, as salter, in the parish of St. Lawrence in London. In 1623 he came to this country, probably in the ship "Ann", which arrived at Plymouth in July of that year. He located first at Nantasket (later the home of Edward Bunn) and soon removed to what is now known as Governor's Island, in Boston Harbor, first named Conant's Island. He was chosen to manage the affairs of the Dorchester Company at

Cape Ann, and in 1626 moved the colony to Salem. He was active in many capacities, and accumulated much land and in 1634 was deputy to the General Court. He died 19 November 1679, and his estate was inventoried at £258, a large sum in those days. He married in the parish of St. Ann's, London, 11 November 1618 Sarah Holton. Their second son, Lot Conant, born about 1624, at Nantasket or Cape Ann, died 29 September 1674 in Beverly, Massachusetts. He was in Marblehead in 1657 and, about 1667 removed to Beverly. He was selectman of Marblehead in 1664, and was dismissed from Salem Church 4 July 1667, to assist in forming a Church in Beverly. He married Elizabeth Walton, who was baptized 27 October 1629, daughter of Rev. William Walton.

ANDREW² MANSFIELD (Robert¹) was born in England about 1620. He came to

Boston in 1636 and to Lynn in 1639 before his father (Lewis and Newhall, p. 187). On 26 March 1661 being then about 38 years old, he made affidavit to the Court at Ipswich, Mass., that he had been an inhabitant of Lynn about 22 or 23 years and in June 1669 "about 49 years old, he testified in court concerning the estate of Frances Axey." (Records and files of the Quarterly Courts of Essex County, Mass. Vol. VIII 1680-1683 p. 256-257, also Warner). Andrew was very active in Town affairs. He was made freeman 8 July 1645. He was a

ELIZABETH CONANT widow of Lot Conant of Beverly and daughter of Rev. Wm. and Elizabeth Walton of Marblehead. She was born in England, baptized at the Parish of Seaton, Devonshire 27 Oct. 1629. She died 29 Sept. 1674. She had 10 children by her first marriage and two of her sons, Nathaniel and John Conant had previously married two of Andrew's daughters. Andrew lived in Beverly for a time after he married Elizabeth Conant. Andrew's will was dated 1 June 1679, with a codicil dated at Boston 19 Nov. 1683. It seems that while attending the General Court he was taken suddenly and seriously ill,

as the codicl was witnessed by members of the court then in session. The Exact date of his death is not known but the inventory of his estate was returned to the Probate Court 28 Nov. 1683, nine days after the codicil was made (Moulton). Son, Nathaniel Walton
